Practices in Research is an annual online open access double blind peer reviewed journal for practice-based research in architecture. The publication is articulated to an annual conference for practice-based research in Architecture with the same name. The journal invites practising architects to explore the relationships between their practice and their research. The focus on the relationship of architectural practice and research can lead to a broad range of contributions, such as considerations about specific design processes, transversal surveys, epistemologic reflections, considerations about tools and media.

Practices in Research is an initiative of the interuniversity research group Architecture In Practice including KU Leuven Department of Architecture, U Liège Faculty of Architecture and ULB La Cambre-Horta Faculty of Architecture.

Peer review process

The editorial team of Practices in Research ensures the quality of the editorial standard.

- 1. An open call for contributions is issued for each issue includinf the instructions for the authors. The call may be combined with invited contributions.
- 2. The editors decide if the contribution fall whitin the scope of the journal and are suitable for inclusion in the issue.
- 3. Accepted contributions then undergo a double-blind peerreview process. The editors selects two independent experts to review the submission.¹ Anonymity is strictly maintained and all information in the paper that identifies the author is removed². The anonymity of the reviews is also ensured. The reviews investigate the scientific rigor, the artistic quality and the clarity of communication of the contibution. It also involves an open comment on the contribution.
- 4. If accepted (no negative review), the author is asked to resubmit the contribution followind the reviews and editorial comments. The editorial team makes the final decision on whether the submission is rejected or accepted.

^{1.} The reviewers are members of the scientific committee. Additional experts may be invited to review the contributions.

^{2.} The editorial board aknowledges that the work of the involved practices may benefit from public recognition in the professional or cultural field through prizes, exhibitions, lectures, etc. The anonimity of the contribution does not address the practice itself but the authors of the contribution.

Special issues

Practices in Research Journal may publish special issues curated by guest editors. These issues fall within the scope of the journal and follow all its policies, under the responsibility of the editor-in-chief. The editor-in-chief or dedicated board members oversee the guest editors. Special issue articles have the same editorial oversight as regular papers, including external peer review. The guest editors' credentials are checked and approved by the editorial board. Papers submitted to a special issue by the guest editor(s) are handled under an independent review process and make up no more than 25% of the issue's total.

Licensing, Copyright terms, Open Access Policy

Practices in Research is published under a Creative Commons Attribution-ShareAlike 4.0 International License and fulfils the DOAJ definition of open access. *Practices in Research* provides immediate Open Access to its content on the principle that making research freely available to the public supports a greater global exchange of knowledge.

Copyright for articles published in this journal is retained by the authors whitout restriction. By appearing in this Open-Access journal, articles are free to use, with proper attribution, in educational and other non-commercial settings. The author(s) hold the copyright and retain publishing rights.

Registration

The contributions are made available through the website of the journal as separate pdf files and as a single pdf file containing the complete issue of the journal.
